INTERIM REPORT TO THE LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE IN RESPONSE TO SCR NO. 100 OF THE 2015 REGULAR SESSION

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 100 of the 2015 Regular Session, attached, urges and requests the Louisiana State Law Institute "to study and make recommendations that would accelerate the state capital punishment appeal process." In fulfillment of this request, the Law Institute assigned the project to its Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure Committee, members of which formed a Postconviction Relief Study Group. This Study Group is also comprised of members of the Louisiana Supreme Court as well as other district and appellate court judges with expertise in this area.

The Study Group has met on numerous occasions over the past year to study the issue, conduct research, and identify issues and deficiencies under current law. The Study Group decided that to best alleviate the problems concerning delays in the state capital punishment appeal process, the capital postconviction relief regime should be separate from that of non-capital postconviction relief. Although the Study Group is nearing completion of its work in formulating revisions to the state capital punishment appeal process, it will be presenting its work to the full Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure Committee in the coming weeks.

A final report will be submitted to the Legislature once the Study Group and the full Committee have received approval of the project from the Council of the Law Institute. The Council will be reviewing the Study Group and Committee's work at its meeting on February 12-13, 2016.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

To urge and request the Louisiana State Law Institute to study and make recommendations that would accelerate the state capital punishment appeal process.

WHEREAS, a study is needed to determine the feasibility of combining the direct and post-conviction appeals of a defendant who has been sentenced to capital punishment; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana has more than eighty inmates serving sentences for capital punishment; and

WHEREAS, many of those inmates have been awaiting decades for the conclusion of elemency review; and

WHEREAS, the legislature recognizes the importance of collecting and verifying objective statistical data on the cost of capital punishment in Louisiana; and

WHEREAS, questions are frequently raised regarding the costs of the administration of a system of capital punishment; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to discuss the timely processing of a capital punishment case in a systematic and effective manner through the conclusion of elemency review.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby request the Law Institute to study and make recommendations that would accelerate the state capital punishment appeal process.

SCR NO. 100 ENROLLED

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Louisiana State Law Institute shall submit a written report of its findings, together with any proposed legislation, to the Legislature of Louisiana no later than February 1, 2016.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the Louisiana State Law Institute.
